STATUTES GOVERNING FOUR YEARS UNDER GRADUATE PROGRAMMES (FYUGP) AS PER NATIONAL EDUCATION POLICY (NEP) 2020

1. PREAMBLE

The government of India has notified National Education Policy (NEP) 2020 on July 29, 2020 based on Dr. Kasturirangan committee's report. The objective is to have holistic and multidisciplinary under-graduate education to produce employable graduates with integrated personality.

The University of Jammu in sync with the academic and administrative reforms recommended in NEP 2020 has designed a Curriculum Framework for Undergraduate Programmes in semester mode under various disciplines from the Academic Session 2022-23. The thrust of NEP under Choice based Credit System (CBCS) is on continuous learning and evaluation, interdisciplinary study and accumulation of course credits. It aims at making the academic programs student oriented, flexible, interdisciplinary and relevant to the times. The students will have ample freedom to select the electives that suit their interest, aptitude and needs. The student is provided abundant opportunity during the programme of study to accumulate credits by opting for Major Courses (MJ), Minor Courses (MI), Multidisciplinary Courses (MD), Ability Enhancement Courses (AE), Skill Enhancement Courses (SE), Value Added Courses (VA) under various disciplines. Students will choose major, minor, multidisciplinary and other courses at the time of their admission. This system aims to strengthen the academic potential of the student, as it provides flexibility in the choice of courses offered beyond the framework of the respective disciplines of study.

The following four years under graduate programmes (FYUGP) structures have been designed in the disciplines: Science, Arts and Humanities, Social and Behavioural Sciences, Commerce, Management and Computer Applications.

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- a) Bachelor of Science (B.Sc.)
- b) Bachelor of Arts and Humanities (B.A.)
- c) Bachelor of Social and Behavioural Sciences (B.A.)
- d) Bachelor of Commerce (B. Com.)
- e) Bechlor of Management (BBA)
- f) Bachelor of Computer Applications (BCA)
- (i) Students will have the option to exit after one year with a certificate, two years with award of the diploma and after three years with the award of the bachelor degree. Successful completion of the four years programme will lead to award of the bachelor degree (honours/research) in a particular subject. Continuation of the undergraduate programmes for the fourth year in colleges and offsite campuses is optional.
- (ii) The present post-graduate programmes in subjects will be restructured into one-year master's degree programmes for honours/research degree holders and two years master's degree programmes for the three years bachelor's degree holders.
- 2. TITLE

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These regulations shall be called "Statutes Governing Four Years Undergraduate Programmes (FYUGP) with Multiple Entry and Exit Options in the Faculties of Science, Arts and Humanities, Social and Behavioral Sciences, Commerce, Management (BBA) and Computer Applications (BCA) under National Education Policy (NEP) 2020" for the university of Jammu, colleges affiliated to university of Jammu and offsite campuses of university of Jammu with effect from the academic year 2022-23.

3. SCOPE AND APPLICATIONS

- (i) The undergraduate academic programmes governed by these statutes shall be of four years duration (Annexure–I) with multiple entry and exit options with appropriate Certifications/Diplomas/Degrees namely,
 - (a) Bachelor's Certificate in a Discipline upon the successful completion of the First


Year (Two Semesters). 2

- (b) Bachelor's Diploma in a Discipline upon the successful completion of the Second Year (Four Semesters).
- (c) Bachelor's Degree in a Discipline at the successful completion of the Third Year (Six Semesters).
- (d) Bachelor's Degree (Honours/Research) in a Discipline at the successful completion of the Four years (Eight Semesters).
- (ii) Eligibility, qualifications, admission procedure and fee structure for each programme of study shall be approved by the Academic Council, University of Jammu.
- (iii) The students who exit with certification, diploma and three years bachelor degree shall be eligible to re-enter in the programme to complete the next levels.
- (iv) Major subject in a discipline is an area in which student graduates for 3 years bachelor degree or 4 years bachelor degree with honours/research. A student has to opt minor course other than major available in the college/offsite campus within the same discipline. However, student/s can swap between minor and major at the start of 3rd semester only if vacancy/s available after following procedure laid down for the purpose. The colleges/nodal departments of the university shall notify the vacancy/s which are to be filled in order of merit out of the applicants in 3rd semester.
- (v) These regulations shall apply to all undergraduate programs offered by the university of Jammu, its offsite campuses and colleges affiliated to university of Jammu with effect from the academic year 2022-23.
- (vi) These regulations shall not apply to distance education programmes, BBA (Hotel management) and BA LLB (5 years) programmes of university of Jammu.

4. **DEFINITIONS**

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- (i) **MAJOR COURSE (MJ):** A major course as discipline specific core course is the field in which a student focuses during the course of his/her degree.
- (ii) **MINOR COURSE (MI):** A minor course is a discipline specific course and shall be different from the major course but within the same discipline.



- (iii) MULTIDISCIPLINARY COURSES FROM OTHER DISCIPLINES (FOUNDATION COURSES) (MD): A multi- disciplinary course is an option to explore disciplines of interest beyond the choices students make in major and minor courses.
- (iv) ABILITY ENHANCEMENT COURSES (AE): These are generic skill courses aimed to enhance skills in communication, language, mathematical ability.
- (v) SKILL ENHANCEMENT COURSES (SE): Skill enhancement courses are aimed to promote skills pertaining to a particular field of study. The purpose of these courses is to provide students life-skills in hands-on mode so as to increase their employability/ selfemployment.
- (vi) **VALUE ADDED COURSES (VA):** Value added interdisciplinary courses are to enhance the standard of the students beyond specified academic curriculum.
- (vii) **SUMMER INTERNSHIP:** Summer internship is a programme to develop professional ability through an appropriate training.
- (viii) **RESEARCH PROJECT/DISSERTATION:** Project work is a course involving application of knowledge in solving/ analyzing/exploring a real-life situation/difficult problems/data analysis etc.
- (ix) CHOICE BASED CREDIT SYSTEM (CBCS): It is a flexible system of learning that focuses from teacher centric to student centric education and permits students to choose course from a wide range of courses, adopt an interdisciplinary approach in learning, make best use of the expertise of available faculty.
- (x) **PROGRAMME:** 'Programme' means a course of study and examination leading to the award of a certificate/diploma/degree in a subject.
- (xi) COURSE: "Course" refers to a paper having specified credits which is a component of a programme in a subject. The courses define the learning objectives and learning outcomes. A course may be designed to comprise lectures/tutorials/laboratory work/field work/outreach activities/project work/ dissertation work/ summer internship/vocational training/map work etc. or a combination of some of these.

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- (xii) ACADEMIC WEEK: "Academic Week" is a unit of five/six working days during which distribution of work is organized as six to eight contact hours on each day. Each semester shall consist of at least 15 weeks of study with 90 working days (excluding the time spent for the conduct of final examination of each semester).
- (xiii) **CREDIT**: Credit is the weightage given to each course of study. It is the numerical value assigned to a course according to the relative importance of the contents and the contact hours required to teach the prescribed syllabi of the programme.

As per prescribed UGC standards: 1 credit = 15 hours of lectures

The instructional days as worked out by the UGC for one academic year are 180 days i.e. 90 days per semester.

Mechanism for Computation of Work-load:

The following mechanism shall be adopted for computation of work-load:

- (a) 1Credit = 1Theory period of one hour duration/week/semester;
- (b) 1Credit = 1Tutorial period of one hour duration/week/semester;
- (c) 1Credit = 1Practical period of two hours duration/week/semester;
- (d) 1Credit = Internship of 1 week/semester.
- (xiv) **DISCIPLINE:** This refers faculty *viz* science, arts and humanities, social and behavioral. sciences, commerce, management (BBA) and computer applications (BCA).
- (xv) "UNIVERSITY" means the University of Jammu; OFFSITE CAMPUS means offsite campus of University of Jammu; COLLEGE means college affiliated to University of Jammu.

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NATIONAL SKILLS QUALIFICATIONS FRAMEWORK: The national skills qualifications framework (NSQF) is a competency-based framework that organises qualifications according to a series of knowledge, skills and aptitude. The NSQF levels, graded from five to eight for four years undergraduate programmes (FYUGP), are defined in terms of learning outcomes which the learner must possess regardless of whether they are obtained through formal, non-formal or informal learning.

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General education has to be synchronized/aligned with skill and vocational education as per national skills qualifications framework. The level descriptors are given in Table 1 (Annexure II) as described in UGC guidelines on national skills qualifications framework. The curriculum should be designed in a manner that at the end of year-1, year-2 and year-3, students are able to meet the level descriptors for levels 5, 6 and 7 of NSQF, respectively.

- (xvii) **DURATION OF THE PROGRAMME**: The undergraduate degree should be of either a three year or four-year duration, with multiple entry and exit options within this period. The four years bachelor's programme is the preferred option as it allows the opportunity to experience the full range of holistic and multidisciplinary education with a focus on major and minor subjects as per the student's preference. The undergraduate programmes shall extend over four academic years (eight semesters). The students can exit after the completion of one academic year (two semesters) with the certificate; diploma after the study of two academic years (four semesters) and regular bachelor degree after the completion of three academic years (six semesters). A candidate who successfully completes a three-year bachelor's degree with minimum CGPA of 7.5 and wishes to pursue the fourth year of the undergraduate programme shallbe allowed to continue the programme to obtain the bachelor's degree with honours/research.
- ACADEMIC BANK OF CREDIT (ABC): The Academic Bank of Credit, a national-level (xviii) facility, will promote the flexibility of the curriculum framework and interdisciplinary/multidisciplinary academic mobility of students across the higher education institutions (HEIs) in the country with an appropriate "credit transfer" mechanism. It is a mechanism to facilitate the students to choose their own learning path to attain a degree/ diploma/certificate, working on the principle of multiple entry and exit as well as anytime, anywhere, and any level of learning. ABC will enable the integration of multiple disciplines of higher learning leading to the desired learning outcomes including increased creativity, innovation, higher-order thinking skills and critical analysis. ABC will provide significant autonomy to the students by providing an extensive choice of courses for a programme of study, flexibility in curriculum, novel and engaging course options across a number of higher education disciplines/ institutions.

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The multiple entries and exit options for students are facilitated at the undergraduate and master's levels. It would facilitate credit accumulation through the facility created by the ABC scheme in the "Academic Bank Account" opened for students across the country to transfer and consolidate their credits by undergoing courses in any eligible HEIs. The ABC allows for credit redemption by commuting the accrued credits in the Academic Bank Account maintained in the ABC to fulfil the credits requirements for awarding certificate/diploma/degree by the authorised HEIs. Upon collecting a certificate, diploma or degree, all the credits earned till then, in respect of that Certificate or degree, shall be debited and deleted from the account concerned. HEIs offering programmes with multiple entries and exit systems need to register in the ABC to enable acceptance of multidisciplinary courses, credit transfer, and credit acceptance.

The validity of credits earned will be for a maximum period of seven years or as specified by the Academic Bank of Credit (ABC). The procedure for depositing credits earned, its shelf life, the redemption of credits would be as per UGC (Establishment and Operationalization of Academic Bank of Credit (ABC) scheme in Higher Education) Regulations, 2021.

5. ADMISSION-GENERAL

- (i) A candidate to be eligible for admission to the four-years under graduate programmes as per NEP 2020 must have passed the higher secondary part-II examination (10+2 pattern) of the Jammu and Kashmir State Board of School Education, CBSE or an examination recognized as equivalent thereto.
- (ii) No candidate who wishes to enter a course of study prescribed by the university shall be admitted to colleges, offsite campuses unless he/she has passed the qualifying examination for admission to such course as prescribed under statutes.
- (iii) A candidate shall be deemed to be student of a college/offsite campus as soon as he/she has been accepted for enrolment by the respective principal/rector/director and has paid the prescribed fee for the course. The admission shall, however, be provisional unless regularized by the university.

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Provided also that payment made in shape of fee paid by a student (which is refundable in case admission or re-admission is refused) does not automatically confirm the right of admission or continuation as a student in the college or offsite campus.

(iv) Production of conduct certificate on admission: A candidate, while applying for admission to a college or offsite campus, shall submit with his/her application a certificate of his/her conduct signed by the head of the institution in which he/she was studying during the year previous to his/her joining the college or offsite campus.

For candidates applying for admission after a lapse of time following passing of higher secondary part-II examination, certificate of conduct must be signed by a gazetted officer.

- (v) The principal/rector/director shall be competent to cancel admission of a student enrolled for a programme of study if he/she remains absent continuously for a period of 20 days without permission of the principal/rector/director concerned.
- (vi) Admission in the government colleges/non-government colleges affiliated to university of Jammu shall be made directly by the admission committee of the college concerned on the basis of marks obtained by the candidate in the qualifying examination.
 - Provided that non-government colleges shall follow the same admission schedule and procedure/statutes as applicable for government colleges.
 - For undergraduate courses in the offsite campuses, admission shall be made by the nodal departments.
- (vii) Admission criteria, preference as well as the reservation policy shall be governed according to the guidelines issued by the Jammu & Kashmir Government.

6. MEDIUM OF INSTRUCTIONS AND EXAMINATION

English shall be the medium of instruction and examination in all papers/courses except in Oriental Classical, Modern Indian Languages and Music where the medium of instruction and examination

shall be the language concerned. 8

7. PEDAGOGY ACROSS ALL PROGRAMMES

Effective learning requires an appropriate curriculum, an apt pedagogy, continuous formative assessment and adequate student support. The intention is to contextualise curriculum through meaningful pedagogical practices, which determine learning experiences directly influencing learning outcomes. Active, cooperative, collaborative and experiential learning pedagogies are some of the examples. The use of technology in creating a learning environment that connects learners with content, peers and instructors all through the learning process, respecting learners' pace is the need of the hour.

- a) Classroom processes must encourage rigorous thinking, reading and writing, debate, discussion, peer learning and self-learning.
- b) The emphasis is on critical thinking and challenge to current subject orthodoxy and develops innovative solutions. Curricular content must be presented in ways that invite questions, not as a body of ready knowledge to be assimilated or reproduced. Faculty should be facilitators of questioning and not authorities on expertise.
- c) Classroom pedagogy should focus on the 'how' of things, i.e. applying theory and ideas. All courses, including social sciences and humanities, should design projects and practicums to enable students to get relevant hands-on experiences.
- d) Learning must be situated in the Indian context to ensure no sense of alienation from their context, country and culture.
- e) Classroom processes must address issues of inclusion and diversity since students are likely to be from diverse cultural, linguistic, socio-economic and intellectual backgrounds.
- f) Cooperative and peer-supported activities must be part of empowering students to take charge of their own learning.
- g) Faculty will have the freedom to identify and use the pedagogical approach best suited to a particular course and student. $\Omega^{-1} = 0$



- h) Pedagogies like PBL (Problem/Project Based Learning) and Service Learning be brought into practice as part of the curriculum. Experiential learning in an internship with a specified number of credits is to be made mandatory.
- i) UGC suggests implementing Blended Mode (BL) as a new mode of teaching-learning in higher education. BL is not a mere mix of online and face-to-face mode, but it refers to a well-planned combination of meaningful activities in both modes. The blend demands consideration of several factors, mainly focussing on learning outcomes and the learnercentred instructional environment.

Implementing BL requires a systematic, planned instructional process. An effective teachinglearning process in a blended environment calls for understanding and skills of using appropriate pedagogies with suitable technologies. The UGC Concept Note provides guidelines for the implementation of BL.

8. ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA FOR ADMISSION TO FOUR YEARS UNDERGRADUATE PROGRAMMES (FYUGP)

Admission to four years undergraduate programmes (FYUGP) shall be on the basis of merit and availability of seats in a particular "Major Subject". For the selection of the major subject, preference shall be given to the candidates who have studied the concerned subject at higher secondary part-II level.

9. PAYMENT OF ADMISSION FEE

The student seeking admission to the four years under graduate programmes (FYUGP) as per NEP 2020 are required to submit the prescribed application form along with requisite fee for the:

- (i) First and second semester courses at the time of seeking admission to first semester;
- (ii) Third and fourth semester courses at the time of seeking admission to the third semester;
- (iii) Fifth and sixth semester courses at the time of seeking admission to the fifth semester
- (iv) Seventh and eighth semester courses at the time of seeking admission to the seventh

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semester.

provided the student continues his/her studies without interruption from first semester to second semester, from third semester to fourth semester, from fifth to sixth semester and from seventh to eighth semester. If there is a gap of one or more year/s, he/she will have to fill up the prescribed application form and pay the fee at the time of seeking admission. Admission to the higher semesters shall be governed by the regulations of NEP 2020 only.

10. Academic calendar

The admission of students to FYUGP in odd and even semesters shall be as per academic calendar issued by higher education department.

Academic calendar

a) The Vice-Chancellor may consider grant of late admission for 10 days after the expiry of last date of admission on payment of late fee as prescribed by the university from time to time.

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- b) Further, the additional time window for the private affiliated colleges shall be 03 days after the expiry of last date as per (a) above on payment of late fee as prescribed by the university.
- Note: (i) No candidate whose result of higher secondary part-II examination has been modified after re-evaluation shall be admitted to the semester-I of four years under graduate programmes (FYUGP) as per NEP-2020 after the expiry of last date of admission.
 - (ii) If a candidate after having completed the prescribed course of a particular semester does not appear or fails in that examination, may be permitted to appear as a private candidate in the subsequent examination of that semester.
 - (iii) Number of lectures in theory, tutorial/ practical shall be counted up to the date the class is dispersed for preparatory holidays, preceding the examination.

11. ADMISSION OF STUDENTS DISQUALIFIED FOR MISCONDUCT/USING UNFAIRMEANS IN EXAMINATIONS

A candidate who has been disqualified for any specific period from the University for misconduct/using un-fair means in examinations shall not be permitted to appear in any examination before the expiry of that period. He/She will also not be permitted to join any college/institution/department at any time during the period of his/her punishment.

12. ONE PROGRAMME AT A TIME

No student shall be admitted to more than one programme at a time in the college/offsite campus, unless otherwise specified in the statutes governing four years under graduate programmes (FYUGP) as per NEP 2020.

13. ELIGIBILITY CERTIFICATE

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No student from another board or any other examining body shall be admitted to college/offsite campus without production of a certificate of eligibility issued by the university. He/She shall apply on the prescribed form to the controller of examinations through the principal/rector/director for a certificate of eligibility and shall pay the prescribed

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fee. All such applications shall be accompanied by qualification and provisional certificates in original of the qualifying examination and migration certificate from the Board/University which he/she intends to leave. Such a candidate shall furnish details of subjects which he/she took in the Board/University from which he/she is migrating and in case a student is migrating after having joined a course in another Board/University but has not completed it and seeks admission to this University for completion of the particular course and if there is a specific provision in the Statutes of the university governing that examination allowing admission during the course, shall furnish a statement of lectures attended, from the head of the institution last attended by him/her along with reasons of migration.

Provided, however, that in case a candidate is not able to produce all the documents required to get eligibility certificate, the Vice-Chancellor on the recommendation of the principal of the college/rector/director of the offsite campus (as the case may be) may authorize the provisional admission at candidate's own risk and responsibility subject to production of some documentary evidence in original of his/her having passed the last examination on the basis of which admission is sought. An undertaking in writing, in the following form, shall in this case be obtained from the applicant duly attested by a first-class magistrate or an oath commissioner or a public notary and forwarded to the university along with the application of the student for grant of eligibility certificate:

"I _________son/daughter of ________ R/O ________hereby declare that I am seeking provisional admission to ________class / semester of the ______course in the ______college on the understanding that my admission to the ______semester is provisional and is subject to confirmation on the issue of certificate of eligibility by the University under rules. If for any reason, whatsoever, the University declines to issue the said certificate, my provisional admission will automatically stand cancelled".

Such provisional admission shall entitle a candidate to join the college at his/her own risk and responsibility on the condition that he/she obtains a final certificate of eligibility before the declaration of the result of the University examination to which the candidate has been

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provided that the request for grant of provisional admission should be made to the university immediately as soon as the candidate applies to the principal of the college/ rector/director of the offsite campus for seeking admission to the university:

provided further that the conditions governing the issue of eligibility certificate shall not apply to such students who have passed an examination of the Jammu and Kashmir state board of school education/CBSE.

Note: In case original qualification certificate of the qualifying examination does not indicate the subjects studied by him/her and the information regarding the subjects is essential for determination of eligibility, the candidate shall be required to produce the marks certificates issued by the board.

OR

In case the candidate is not in a position to produce the original qualification certificate and provisional certificate, he/she shall be required to produce the marks certificate of the qualifying examination issued by the board/university. But if the marks certificate does not indicate the parentage, the candidate is required to produce some other evidence along with the marks certificate in support of his/her parentage.

14. PRODUCTION OF MIGRATION CERTIFICATE

Candidates seeking admission to colleges and offsite campuses after having been admitted as members of another board/university incorporated by law for the time being in force, shall not be registered unless their applications for registration are accompanied by a migration certificate from the previous board/university.

15. REGISTRATION RETURNS

(i) The principal and rector/director shall forward to the controller of examinations three copies of registration returns (RR) containing the name and other particulars of each student admitted or re-admitted for a particular programme in that college in Semester I, III, V and VII as the case may be, along with a soft copy within 30 days after the last date of admission, on the prescribed proforma along with the fee prescribed by the university from time to time

time to time. 14

If the name of a student is struck off from the rolls of a college or offsite campus or a student migrates to another college or offsite campus, such fact shall immediately be reported to the controller of examinations.

(ii) <u>Supplementary Registration Returns</u>: In case the college could not submit the enrollment of the even semester students, the college can submit the supplementary registration returns of those students in subsequent examinations as per format prescribed by the university alongwith requisite fee, if any.

16. LATE FEE SUBMISSION OF REGISTRATION RETURN

For first count of 10 days after the last date prescribed i.e. after 30 days after last date of admission with late fee of Rs.100/- per candidate be charged. For another count of 10 days delay, Rs.200/- per candidate shall be charged. Thereafter, no registration return shall be accepted and the sole responsibility for non determination of eligibility of such candidate shall lie on the part of the concerned college / offsite campus. The fee may vary as is revised and notified by the university from time to time.

17. REGISTRATION FEE

The registration fee as prescribed by the university shall be paid once only irrespective of the number of times the candidate appears at the examinations of the university either as a student or an ex-student of an affiliated college or the offsite campus or the department of the university or any recognized institution, or as a private candidate. No further fee for registration shall be charged, unless a student's name is, for any reason other than legitimate migration, struck off from the rolls of a college or the offsite campus or the department of the university or any recognized institution, in which case he/she shall pay the fee prescribed by the university to have his/her name re-entered in the register of students.

18. REGISTER OF STUDENTS

The controller of examinations shall maintain a register of all students registered in the university. In this register, name of each registered student, his/her parentage, permanent address, date of birth based on the certificate of the matriculation/higher secondary or any

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other recognized examination passed by the candidate, the dates of admission or re-admission and/or leaving any college, every pass or failure in a university examination with his/her number, migration, any university scholarship, medal or prize won by or any punishment awarded to the student shall be recorded.

Each entry in the register of students shall be attested by an officer of the university authorized in this behalf. no one shall be admitted to any examination of the university unless he/she has been registered as a student of the university.

19. COPY OF ENTRIES IN THE REGISTER OF STUDENTS

Any registered student may, at any time, receive certified copy/copies of all the entries relating to him/her in the register of students on payment of the prescribed fee for each copy.

20. TRANSFER OF ADMISSION

Transfer of admission is permissible only in odd semesters for students of different colleges/offsite campuses of university as per regulations of FYUGP under NEP 2020.

Conditions for transfer of admission of students of other Universities:

A candidate migrating from any other University may be permitted to join odd semester of the degree programme provided he/she has passed all the subjects of previous semesters. Such candidates must satisfy all other conditions of eligibility stipulated in the regulations of the university.

- a) His/her transfer of admission shall be within the intake of the college.
- b) The courses/ programme of study prescribed/pursued by the candidate in the university from which he/she seeks migration are not materially different from the courses/programmes prescribed to be pursued in the university;

provided that such a candidate who has not qualified the semester examination with the subjects/combination of subjects for which he/she intends to seek admission to the next higher class of the university shall be required to qualify such subjects of the qualifying

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examination of the university as may be determined by the university.

- c) He/she shall fulfill the attendance requirements as per the university regulation.
- d) The candidate who is migrating from other university is eligible for overall SGPA/CGPA or Class and not for ranking.
- e) He/She shall complete the programme as per the regulations governing the maximum duration of completing the programme as per this regulation.

The marks/grades obtained/credits earned in four years under graduate programmes as per NEP 2020 examinations conducted by another university from which the candidate has migrated shall be taken into account for determining the final result (by increasing or reducing the marks/grades/credits in accordance with the maximum marks/grades/credits of the four years under graduate programmes of the university).

21. ATTENDANCE IN LIEU OF PARTICIPATION IN GAMES ETC.

Any candidate who participates in games, cultural and other co-curricular activities as defined below with the prior approval of the principal/rector/director concerned shall, for the purpose of condoning deficiency in attendance incurred by him/her on account of such participation, be treated as present on all the working days during the days of his/her absence on such account for a period of 15 working days in a semester programme subject to maximum of 30 working days in a year.

- (a) State representation in international/all India competitions organized by agencies which are recognized by the board of sports and youth welfare.
- (b) Participation in the inter-university competitions held under the auspices of a university or any other recognized institution as a member of the university team.
- Participation in the inter-college competitions organized by the university as a member of the team of participating institutions.
- (d) Participation in the N.C.C., N.S.S. and National Integration Samiti activities as a
 member of recognized Institutions.

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- (e) Participation in the coaching camps/rehearsals prior to participation as a member of state or university team in the national/all India/ inter- university competitions.
- (f) Participation in the mountaineering/hiking/trekking/skiing/rock-climbing or other such activities organized under the auspices of the UT Government/university as a member of the institution affiliated/recognized by the university.
- Note: For outstanding cases (requiring attendance waiver due to duty beyond 30 days) special permission may be sought from the Vice Chancellor / competent authority on the recommendation of the principal/rector/director concerned.

22. FOUR -YEARS UNDER GRADUATE PROGRAMMES STRUCTURE REGULATIONS

- (i) **Major Course (MJ):** Any subject in a discipline in which student wants to graduate for 3 years bachelor degree or 4 years bachelor degree with honours/research.
- (ii) Minor Course (MI): Any subject other than major available in the college / offsite campus within the same discipline.
- (iii) **Multidisciplinary Course (MD):** Any subject/s of student's choice which is of interdisciplinary nature from faculties other than major and minor with the condition that the subject opted for shall not be repeated in any semester.
- (iv)Ability Enhancement Course (AE): It may be modern Indian language (MIL), English language (general), communication skill, mathematical ability. MIL includes Hindi/Dogri/Urdu/Punjabi.
- (v) Skill Enhancement Course (SE): The courses shall be chosen from the basket of courses from NSQF as notified by the university of Jammu. The university departments/respective board of studies can propose new courses in addition to NSQF.
- (vi) Value Added Courses (VA) : Four compulsory courses are:

(a) Understanding India (b) Environmental Science and Education c) Digital Technology (d) Health and Wellness 18

In addition, following optional value added courses shall be offered by the college subject to the availability of faculty/infrastructure:

- (a) Community Engagement
- (b) National Cadet Corp (NCC)
- (c) National Service Scheme (NSS)
- (e) Cultural

(f) Yoga Education

(d) Sports

(vii) Summer Internship:

It shall be a short-term internship of duration 15 days in 5th semester for a job/professional training in a suitable organization or hands on training or activity-based course at college level in order to gain work experience. The internship shall be under a college teacher who will be designated as Internship Supervisor. After completion of summer internship students will have to produce a report related to the work carried out.

(viii) Research project/Dissertation:

Project work is considered a unique course involving applying knowledge in solving/ analysing/exploring a real-life situation/complex problem/ data analysis. Project work has the intention to provide research competencies at the undergraduate level. It enables the acquisition of special/ advanced knowledge through support study/a project work. This course is applicable to students in 8th semester of undergraduate research program. A separate guideline shall be issued with regard to the evaluation of the Research project/Dissertation.

23. CREDIT PLAN OF THE FOUR YEARS UNDERGRADUATE PROGRAMME UNDER NATIONAL EDUCATION POLICY (NEP 2020)

1. Major Course

Each student will study for

- a) 62 Credits in Major for Three Years Graduation
- b) 94 Credits in Major for Four Years Graduation (Honours)
- c) 82 Credits in Major for Four Years Graduation (Research)

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Major Course can be any subject chosen from the following six disciplines

- I. Science
- II. Arts and Humanities
- III. Social and Behavioural Sciences
- IV. Commerce
- V. Management (BBA)
- VI. Computer Applications (BCA)

2. Minor Course

Each student will study

- a) 24 credits of minor course for three year graduation from 1st to 6th semester (4 credits in each semester)
- b) 32 credits of minor in same subject for four year graduation (honours)/ (research)

3. Multidisciplinary Courses from other disciplines (Foundation Courses)

09 Credits of multidisciplinary courses of 03 credits each from 1st to 3rd semesters from disciplines other than major and minor with the condition that the subject opted for shall not be repeated in any semester.


4. Ability Enhancement Courses

Modern Indian Languages (MIL)-Hindi/Dogri/Urdu/ Punjabi, English language (General), Communication Skills and Mathematical Ability.

09 Credits of AEC Courses of 03 Credits each from 1st to 3rd Semester.

5. Skill Enhancement Courses

06 Credits of Skill Enhancement Courses (SE) of 02 Credits each from 1st to 3rd Semester The courses shall be chosen from the basket of courses from NSQF as notified by the



university of Jammu. The university departments/ respective Board of Studies can propose new courses in addition to NSQF.

6. Value Added Courses

Four credits comprising of two courses (02 credits each) in 1st and 2nd semester(s) are compulsory courses.:

- (a) Understanding India (b) Environmental Science and Education
- (c) Digital Technology (d) Health and Wellness

In addition to the above, there will be two optional courses of two credits each in 3^{rd} and 4^{th} semester(s) out of the following:

- (a) Community Engagement
- (b) National Cadet Corp (NCC)
- (c) National Service Scheme (NSS)
- (e) Cultural

(f) Yoga Education

(d) Sports

7. Summer Internship

Each student is required to undergo 02 credits of internship in 5th semester.

8. Research Project/Dissertation

Students pursuing Under Graduate Degree (Research) shall be required to undergo a Research Project/Dissertation of 12 credits in 8th semester.

Credit Summary:

- 1 Year Certificate = minimum 40 credits
- 2 Year Diploma = minimum 80 credits
- **3 Year Degree** = 120 credits

4 Year Degree = 160 credits

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Note: Student/s can swap between Minor and Major at the start of 3rd semester only if vacancy/s are available after following procedure laid down for the purpose. The college shall notify the vacancy/s which are to be filled in order of merit out of the applicants.

24. NOMENCLATURE OF THE COURSES

Following is the nomenclature of courses to be used for Four Years Undergraduate Programme NEP 2020.

The Course Code shall consist of 09 characters:

- First character for Undergraduate.
- The next two characters for Major/Minor/MD/AE/SE/VA. (MJ stands for Major; MI stands for Minor; MD stands for Multidisciplinary; AE stands for Ability Enhancement Course; SE stands for Skill Enhancement Course and VA stands for Value Added Course).
- > The next two characters for Course Code.
- The next character for nature of course (T=Theory cum Practical cum Tutorial, I= Summer Internship, P= Project/Dissertation).
- \blacktriangleright The next character for the semester.
- > The last two characters for the course number.

25. SUBJECTS OFFERING

(i) A candidate shall have to opt the subjects prescribed as per course framework (Annexure-III) from the academic session 2022-23 for four years under graduate programmes (FYUGP) under national education policy (NEP) 2020.

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- (ii) A major course can be chosen as any subject from the six disciplines (Annexure-III). A minor course opted by the student shall be different from the major course but within the same discipline.
 - (iii) Student/s can swap between minor and major at the start of 3rd semester only if vacancy/s are available after following procedure laid down for the purpose. The college shall notify the vacancy/s which are to be filled in order of merit out of the applicants.
 - (iv) A student has to opt multidisciplinary courses of 03 credits each from 1st to 3rd semesters from disciplines other than major and minor with the condition that the subject opted for shall not be repeated in any semester.
 - (v) A student has to opt ability enhancement courses of 03 credits each (Modern Indian Languages (MIL)-Hindi/Dogri/Urdu/Punjabi, English language (General), Communication Skills and Mathematical Ability) from 1st to 3rd semesters.
 - (vi) A student has to opt skill enhancement courses of 2 credits each from 1st to 3rd Semester. The courses shall be chosen from the basket of courses from NSQF as notified by the university of Jammu or as proposed by the respective board of studies.
 - (vii) A student has to study two value added courses (02 credits each) in 1st and 2nd semester(s) as compulsory courses. In addition, there will be two optional value added courses of two credits each in 3rd and 4th semester(s) other than compulsory course in 1st and 2nd semester(s).
 - (viii)Each student is required to undergo 02 credits of internship in 5th semester.
 - (ix) Students pursuing under graduate degree (research) shall be required to undergo a research project/dissertation of 12 credits in 8th semester.

26. AUTHORITY FOR PRESCRIPTION OF COURSES OF STUDIES

The syllabi and courses of study for each subject shall be prescribed by the academic council on the recommendations of the respective board of studies. In case where text-books are prescribed, a candidate shall be required not only to show a thorough knowledge of text-books but also to have ability to answer questions of a similar standard set with a view to testing

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his/her general knowledge of the subject.

27. MODIFICATIONS TO THE REGULATIONS

Notwithstanding the foregoing, any amendments / modifications issued or notified by the university grants commission/ higher education commission of India and its verticals such as national higher education regulatory council, general education council or the state government, from time to time, shall be deemed to have been incorporated into these regulations and shall constitute an integral part of these regulations.

28. SCHEME OF EXAMINATION

Each course shall be comprised of mid semester assessment test and end-semester examination. The responsibility of conduct and evaluation of the mid semester assessment test lies with the course coordinator. The end semester examination shall be conducted by the university and question papers shall got set by the controller of examinations except skill and value added courses. The mid semester assessment marks awarded to the students in each course shall be displayed on the notice board well in advance, at least one week before the commencement of end semester examination. The 03/04 and 02 credits paper shall have 04 and 03 units, respectively. The evaluation of the skill and value added courses will be internal.

Practicals/Tutorials as applicable in a course (major/minor) are extension of the theory programme in an inbuilt (3+1) credits course i.e. 03 credits of theory and 01 credit of practical/tutorial. However, 02 credits major course of 5th semester will have only theory component. Each four credits paper will have 75 marks for theory and 25 marks for practical/tutorial. The break-up for 75 marks for theory paper shall contain 15 marks for mid semester assessment test and 60 marks for end semester examination. There will be continuous assessment of 10 marks and final examination of 15 marks for practical/tutorial component in each course.



The 03 credits paper shall be of 75 marks consisting of 60 marks for external examination and 15 marks for mid semester assessment test. All 02 credits courses shall be of 50 marks comprising 40 marks for external examination and 10 marks for mid semester assessment test.

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Summer Internship:

Each student is required to undergo 02 credits of internship comprising 50 marks in 5th semester. The board of studies will formulate suitable internship programme in their respective subject in way to impart practical knowledge to the students and proper assessment of the internship course. The designated Internship Supervisor will monitor the progress and evaluate student's internship course at the end of semester on the basis of Internship Report/Seminar presentation/Viva-voce. The evaluation of the internship course shall be internal.

Research project/Dissertation:

Students pursuing Under Graduate Degree (Research) shall be required to undergo a Research Project/Dissertation of 12 credits (300 marks) in 8th semester. The respective board of studies shall formulate the curriculum of research project / dissertation comprising of credit distribution out of 12 credits alongwith instructions regarding time bound completion of the project. A separate guideline shall be issued with regard to the evaluation of the Research project/Dissertation.

29. MINIMUM ELIGIBILITY FOR APPEARANCE IN EXAMINATION

A semester end external examination under four years under graduate programmes (FYUGP) as per NEP 2020 shall be open to the following categories of students:

- (A) A regular student i.e. a student who has undergone a regular course of study in a college / offsite campus for the period specified for that course of study by having been on the rolls of the college / offsite campus immediately preceding the examination and has his/her name submitted to the controller of examinations by the concerned college / offsite campus where he/she has pursued the course for the examination and has fulfilled the following conditions to be certified by the college principal /rector/director of offsite campus concerned:
 - (i) He/she has been a student of good conduct.
 - (ii) He/she has attended not less than 75% of the lectures delivered including seminars, tutorials, practical's etc. in each course opted by him/her in that semester.

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(iii) He/she has secured pass marks in internal assessment in at least 75% of the papers.

(iv) He/she has paid the prescribed fee.

(B) Students who after having undergone a regular course of study and having completed all conditions of eligibility for appearance in a course(s) in a semester examination including minimum attendance requirement and having passed in internal assessment and having either failed to pass the semester examination in that subject/paper(s) or been unable to appear in the examination in that subject/paper(s) will be eligible to appear as a private candidate in the examination by submitting his/her application on the prescribed form in online/offline mode along with prescribed fee to reach the controller of examinations within the dates fixed for the purpose.

30. PROMOTION TO NEXT SEMESTER

- (i) A student will be eligible for promotion from semester-I to semester-II if he/she has secured pass marks in internal assessment in at least 75% of the papers of the semester-I.
- (ii) A student will be eligible for promotion from semester-II to semester-III provided he/she has earned atleast 50% of the total credits of semesters-I as well as passed in internal assessments of at least 75% of the papers of semester-II.
- (iii) A student will be eligible for promotion from semester-III to semester-IV if he/she has secured pass marks in internal assessment in at least 75% of the papers of semester-III.
- (iv) A student will be eligible for promotion from semester-IV to semester-V provided he/she has earned atleast 50% of the total credits of semesters-II and 50% of the total credits of semesters-III as well as passed in internal assessments of at least 75% of the papers of semester-IV.
- (v) A student will be eligible for promotion from semester-V to VI if he/she has secured pass marks in internal assessment in at least 75% of the papers of the semester-V.
- (vi) A student who does not fulfill the promotion criteria (i), (ii), (iii), (iv) and (v) above shall be declared fail in the semester concerned. However, he/she shall have the option to retain the

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marks in the papers in which he/she has secured pass marks.

- (vii) A student who has to reappear in a paper prescribed for semester-I to IV shall appear in the subsequent semester end examination to be held as per the dates prescribed by the university.
- (viii) Only those candidates who have successfully completed three-years bachelor's degree with minimum CGPA of 7.5 shall be allowed to continue fourth year of the undergraduate programme to obtain the bachelor's degree (honours/research).
- (ix) A student will be eligible for promotion from semester-VII to semester-VIII if he/she has secured pass marks in internal assessment in at least 75% of the papers of the semester-VII.
- (x) Candidates who successfully complete their four years bachelor's degree with honours /research are eligible to enter the "Two Semester Master's Degree Programme".
- (xi) Candidates who successfully complete their four years bachelor's degree (research) are eligible to enter the "Doctoral (Ph.D.) Programme" in a relevant subject if he/she fulfills the criterion requirement as per NHEQF.
- (xii) A student who has to reappear in a paper(s) prescribed for semester-VI and VIII shall appear in the supplementary examination.

31. CONDONATION OF LECTURES

- (i) The concerned principal/reactor/director of the college/offsite campuses may condone shortage in attendance of student in a semester for special reasons to be recorded in writing up to 6% of the lectures delivered/practical's conducted/tutorials in each course separately.
- (ii) Any candidate, who falls short of attendance beyond condonable limits or whose shortage in attendance is not condoned by the competent authorities and wants to pursue the programme, shall be required to re-join the course along with the next batch of students of the same class to make up the deficiency by attending the required number of lectures by which he/she had fallen short. This provision shall however, be applicable only in respect of such of the candidates who have attended at least 50% classes in the said course/s. Candidates having attended less than 50% of the lectures in a particular course/s shall be considered for re-admission after depositing afresh the prescribed admission fee for the

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semester / course. However, such candidate/s shall appear in the examination along with the candidates of the semester, with which he/she has been re-admitted, in regular capacity.

provided in case such a student again falls short of lectures he/she shall not be allowed to seek admission to that course in any affiliated college/offsite campus in any subsequent year.

(iii) A student who has been on the rolls of a college in the semester-I, II, III, IV, V, VI and VII of four years under graduate programmes and earns eligibility to join the semester-II or III or IV or V or VI or VII or VIII of the programme as the case may be, but fails to join the semester when he/she was due to join it or discontinues his/her studies for any reason whatsoever may be considered for admission to the semester concerned in a subsequent year if he/she submits application to this effect before the commencement of the semester concerned provided a seat and other facilities for the courses are available in the college concerned in the semester he/she wishes to join and the student seeks admission within a period of one year from the date he/she discontinue his/her studies.

32. SCRUTINY OF ADMISSION APPLICATIONS TO EXAMINATIONS

All applications for admission to university examinations shall be scrutinized by comparison with the register of students and the controller of examinations may refuse any application of any candidate about whom complete particulars have not been reported, and require him/her to forward through the officer who has attested his/her application for admission, a complete statement of the particulars which have not been properly reported, together with an additional registration fee prescribed by the university.

33. DATE OF SUBMISSION OF EXAMINATION FORMS TO THE UNIVERSITY

The principal of the college concerned / reactor / director of the offsite campuses shall furnish the examination forms of the enrolled students to the controller of examinations alongwith requisite fee within 21 days from the date notified by the controller of examinations.

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34. EXAMINATION FEES

The students shall be required to pay examination fee as prescribed by the University from time to time.

35. DATES OF SEMESTER END EXAMINATIONS

The semester end examinations shall be as per the dates notified in the academic calendar. However, exact dates and the centres of examination shall be notified by the controller of examinations, university of Jammu, Jammu.

36. EXEMPTION TO RE-APPEAR IN MID SEMESTER EXAMINATION/ TUTORIALS/PRACTICAL EXAMINATION ONCE QUALIFIED

A candidate who appears and passes in the mid semester examination / tutorials/practical examination of a subject but fails to qualify end semester examination in that paper shall be exempted from appearing in the mid semester examination / tutorials/practical examination of that paper subsequently and the marks obtained by him/her in the last attempt in which he/she passed in the mid semester examination / tutorials/practical examination of a subject shall be carried over. Consequently, he/she shall be required to appear in the theory part of that subject in the subsequent examination.

37. RE-APPEAR CATEGORY FOR FAILURES

A candidate who fails in four years under graduate programmes in semester-I/II/III/IV/V/VI/VII/VII examination but has secured pass marks (separately in the mid semester examination and end semester examination) in a subject or subjects, shall be exempted from appearing in such subject(s) and shall be allowed to appear in the remaining subject(s) in a subsequent examination(s) on payment of prescribed fee on each occasion and if he/she passes in the subject(s) he/she shall be declared to have passed the examination.

provided that re-appear/failure candidates shall have to appear in the four years under graduate programmes in semester-I/II/III/IV/V/VI/VII/VIII examination (as the case may be) as per the syllabi in vogue and fulfillment of other statutory conditions.

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38. SUPPLEMENTARY EXAMINATION

There shall be supplementary examination for the semester- VI and VIII only.

39. PASSING CRITERION

The minimum Grade/Marks (%) required to pass each paper in a semester examination under FYUGP shall be 36% in each theory paper in mid semester examination and end semester examination, separately. However, to qualify for tutorials/practical's, the passing criteria is 36% marks in continuous assessment component and final examination component put together. If the candidate fails in tutorial/practical and passes in mid semester and end semester theory examination, such candidate shall reappear for tutorial/practical examination only and vice versa.

For summer internship, research project/ dissertation, passing criteria is 40% marks.

40. DETERMINATION OF GRADES

SGPA and CGPA

(i) SGPA: The SGPA is the ratio of sum of the product of the number of credits with the grade points scored by a student in all the courses taken by a student and the sum of the number of credits of all the courses undergone by a student, i.e.

SGPA (Si) = Σ (Ci x Gi) / Σ Ci,

where Ci is the number of credits of the ith course and Gi is the grade point scored by the student in the ith course.

(ii) CGPA: The CGPA is also calculated in the same manner taking into account all the courses undergone by a student over all the semesters of a programme, i.e.

$$\mathbf{CGPA} = \Sigma(\operatorname{Ci} x \operatorname{Si}) / \Sigma \operatorname{Ci}$$

where Si is the SGPA of the ith semester and Ci is the total number of credits in that semester.

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(ii) The SGPA and CGPA shall be rounded off to 2 decimal points and reported in the transcripts.

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The declaration of result shall be based on the Semester Grade Point Average (SGPA) earned towards the end of each semester or the Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA) earned towards the completion of all the eight semesters of the Programme and the corresponding overall Letter grades. If some candidates exit at the completion of first, second or third year of the four years undergraduate programmes, with Certificate, Diploma, three years Degree or four years degree, respectively, then the results of successful candidates at the end of second, fourth or sixth semesters shall also be classified on the basis of the Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA) obtained in the Two, Four or Six or Eight Semesters, respectively for award of:

- Bachelor's Certificate in Arts/Science/Commerce
- Bachelor's Diploma in Arts/Science/Commerce
- Bachelor's Degree in Arts/Science/Commerce
- Bachelor's Degree with honours/research in a discipline/subject

Grading System: Absolute grading would be used where the marks obtained are converted to grades based on pre-determined class intervals. To implement the following grading system, the colleges /campuses shall use the following UGC recommended 10-point grading system:

- (i) A student obtaining Grade F shall be considered failed and will be required to reappear in the examination as per existing rules of the university under semester system for under graduate courses.
- (ii) Grade (D) or percentage of marks (36%) is required to pass in a course, SGPA of 4 to qualify a semester and a minimum CGPA of 4 to qualify for a UG degree.

Calculation of Semester grade Point Average (i.e. SGPA is the grade point received in a particular semester by a candidate), Cumulative Grade Point Average (i.e. CGPA is the average grade points obtained in all the semesters) and the Percentage of Marks, the following formulas are used:

i. SGPA = Credit Points/Credit

ii. CGPA = Total Credit Points Earned/Total Credits of the Programme

iii. Percentage of Marks = CGPA x 10 Sumli 33 QI

The description of Grades awarded, conversion of percentage and the marks converted into . Grade points in a particular course/paper can be calculated with the help of Table I and II.

Example: SGPA of a student in six semesters:

I-7.0, II-7.2, III-6.8, IV-7.8, V-7.0, VI-7.0

7.0+7.2+6.8+7.8+7.0+7.0 = 42.8

CGPA = 42.8/6 = 7.1

Percentage = 71%

41. RE-EVALUATION OF ANSWER SCRIPTS

 (i) Re-evaluation of answer scripts of semester end examinations shall be permissible in each course of a semester examination of four years under graduate programmes as per the university statutes.

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(ii) Re-evaluation shall not be permitted in the mid semester theory papers, tutorials, practical's, skill courses, value added courses, internship, project report, dissertation.

42. ISSUANCE OF DEGREE

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A candidate who is declared to have qualified all the six/eight semesters of four years under graduate programmes shall be awarded a degree in a particular discipline under statutes.

43. ENTITLEMENT OF AWARDS OF SCHOLARSHIP/ PRIZE/MEDAL

The University Ranks, Gold-Medals, Scholarships etc., shall be awarded as per the regulations to be issued by the university lateron.

44. TRANSITORY PROVISION

Notwithstanding anything contained in these regulations, the Vice-Chancellor shall, for a period of three years from the date of coming into force of these regulations, have the power to provide by order that these regulations shall be applied to any programme with such modifications as may be necessary.

45. AUTHORITY TO INTERPRET STATUTES

With a view to remove any difficulty arising out of the application and implementation of these statutes, the Vice-Chancellor shall be competent to give final interpretation of these statutes which shall be final and binding on all concerned.

46. REPEAL AND SAVINGS

The existing Regulations governing three years Bachelor Degree Programmes in the faculties of Arts, Science and Commerce shall stand repealed and replaced by the new regulations under NEP 2020. However, the above Regulations shall continue to be in force for the students who have been admitted to the course before the enforcement of these regulations.


